Up until 1970, the camp did not use a food service for its kitchen. From the founding of the camp in 1905 until 1970, we hired our own staff. Almost all of our cooks, kitchen managers and helpers came from south-eastern Virginia from an area called King and Queen County. From 1948 until 1970, our kitchen manager was CHARLEY WILLIAMS. CHARLEY was a nephew of JOHN WILLIAMS who was the camp chef and kitchen manager from 1917 until his death in 1948. CHARLEY had been on the staff from the time he went to college, while he was getting his Master's degree from Columbia University, and during his teaching career at King and Queen Central High School. He retired in 1977 after 35 years of teaching, counseling and leading the high school as principal.
