MYSTERIOUS STONE PILES — ARE THEY INDIAN, SETTLER, VIKING?

Last summer some of our campers and counselors discovered almost sixty stone piles on one bank of the stream which is the outlet of Tripp Lake. They are all in one area, and definitely stacked up by someone, but no one has yet been able to discover WHOpiled them up, WHYthey did it, or WHENthey did it. Some of the piles are 3' high and 6' across.

Dolores Elliott, an archaeologist from the State University of New York at Binghamton, has been out to see them. She has also found a number of other sites where similar clusters of stone piles have been found. She has charted over 30 sites within a few miles of Binghamton! So far no one has found any artifacts near the sites to help identify their origin.

Next summer we are hoping to be much more involved in this mystery. All the camp property needs to be explored for other mounds. A field trip to another site nearby will be taken. This site has far more mounds and they are better built. Help will be needed to dig around and look for artifacts. It will be a good experience for those interested in exploring, orienteering, geology and archaeology. Perhaps one of our campers will discover something of real interest and importance to science!

LATEST NEWS ON THE NEW JUNIOR CAMP SOCCER FIELD AND THE CAMP RIDING RING --

In the fall of 1979 and in the spring of 1980, WINK was able to get the basic grading of the new area completed. As soon as the camp season ended and the fall crops were harvested, he went to work to complete the fields. The riding ring rails came down and they are now making excellent kindling wood for Mr. Ed's woodburning furnace. A backhoe was brought in and a ditch dug along the upper side and each end of the field. Six truck loads of gravel were brought in plus a tremendous coil of plastic drainfield pipe. Black plastic was put over the pipe to keep dirt from working down into it and then the ditch was filled. The big bulge on the lakeside of the riding ring was removed with the dirt moved over to add width to the other end of the soccer field. After the final grading with the bulldozer, a large stone rake, usually used to rake stones off the dirt roads in our township, was borrowed to rake the stones in rows so they could be hauled off the fields. (Old timers in Susquehannock County say that one of our best crops are our stones that keep working up to the surface with each

year's frost. Early this spring, WINK spread lime and fertilizer on the new field. Grass seed will be planted just as soon as the growing season starts. Hopefully we shall have a fairly good crop of grass by camp time but much will depend on the weather. Warm weather and plenty of rain will help!

The new riding ring will be located closer to the lake and closer to the stables than the old riding ring. It is being built where a farmhouse once stood and will extend from the farmhouse woodshed toward the "Paledstra." It will be just as wide but much longer than the present ring. To prepare this space, the old brooder house for our baby chicks had to be torn down, the foundations of the house had to be removed and the cellar filled. Also, a number of trees had to be taken down. In the area was a well which had been dug by hand to a distance of approximately 20 feet. Drainage had to be arranged from this well, again with the aid of the backhoe. This well was probably dug at least 100 years ago and consisted of a very thick circle of stones to hold back the earth. WINK, with the help of his grandson, TOM O'BRIEN, has cut locust trees for posts for the new riding ring. Locust makes an excellent fence post because it does not rot in the ground as soon as other woods. So, happy riding!

When MR. ED went to see the basketball game between Princeton and Cornell, the first people whom he met at the game were MR. and MRS. WILLIAM TRYON. MR. TRYON was a Susquehannock counselor and his sons BILL and RON were Susquehannock campers. MR. TRYON was an outstanding football player at Princeton, graduating in 1953. He has had a distinguished career in amateur golf, winning the New York State Amateur Championship. Although a

Princeton alumnus, he was rooting for Cornell because his son, RON, was playing for the Cornell varsity even though he is only a freshman. There was another former camper on the Cornell team - PHIL CALL of Batavia, NY. PHIL was one of the many members of the Call family to attend Susquehannock. His brother PETE ended his distinguished Cornell basketball career last year. While at Cornell, PETE roomed with a former Susquehannock counselor, DAVE KINTIGH who was co-captain of the Cornell football team in his senior year.

The next familiar face whom MR. ED spied at the game was DUNCAN MACNICHOL. He reported that he was busy writing his major senior paper called a thesis, with his subject being taken from U.S. military history.
