



# A Brief History of Camp Susquehannock

Camp Susquehannock began in 1905 as a tutoring and sports camp for boys. It opened with six campers and four counselors under the direction and inspiration of **G. Carlton (“King”) Shafer**, Princeton '03 (cum laude) and Columbia Law School '09. After graduation from Princeton, he taught for three years at The Lawrenceville School. There were two other partners in the founding of Susquehannock: **Samuel Osbourn**, graduate of Hampton-Sidney, and **Ted Hewitt** of Yale.

After renting land for four years at the eastern end of Tripp Lake, King Shafer purchased the first of many tracts of land in 1909. By 1910 the present main lodge at Susquehannock for Boys was built and in use (see front cover). By 1920 the Camp had grown to nearly 200 campers and 50 staff. King Shafer's reign ended with his death in 1959. His sons **Edwin** and **George** ably took over Camp operations, aided, in no small measure, by the loyal “King's Men”: **Dr. Samuel Osbourn**, headmaster of Germantown Academy; **Wesley Cunningham** of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute; **Charlie Eckles** of Episcopal Academy; **Dr. Paul Elicker**, principal of the Newton (MA) High School; **Ernest Smith** of St. Paul's School in Garden City, Long Island; **Jake Basy** of Germantown Academy; **Hal Thatcher** of Wilkes College, and his wife, **Gingie**; **Benny Howarth** of St. Mark's School in Southboro, MA; **Jim Steen** of Garden City High School; **Ed Strange** of Upper Darby High School; **Jon Kulp** of Episcopal Academy; **Bob Partridge** of the Kent School; and **Buff Weigand** of Penn Charter.

In 1986, the Shafers leased the former Camp Choconut site ten miles away in Friendsville, PA, and started a sister camp, Susquehannock for Girls. The great foundation and philosophy of Susquehannock for Boys plus the inspiration and excitement of Camp Choconut, once on the site, and Camp Oneka, where Shafer daughters had gone before the new camp for girls was founded, helped this new camp flourish. Over the years “S4G” has developed its own unique personality and traditions.



Gateway to S4G

In 2001, a group of dedicated Camp alumni, parents, and friends formed Camp Susquehannock, Inc. (CSI). This group, now led by **Heather Elliott Hoover**, a pioneer camper at Camp Susquehannock for Girls, is managing and directing the camps as a not-for-profit corporation. Many former campers, parents, staff, and friends of camp make up the Board of Trustees, and our Executive Director,

**Dave Williams**, is entering his third year at the helm.

Today there are not just sons, nephews, and grandsons of former campers, but daughters, nieces, and granddaughters. The Camp family has spread around the world, and each summer many states and nations are represented on the Susquehannock hilltops. Camp Susquehannock for Boys has been accredited by the American Camping Association (ACA) since 1970. Camp Susquehannock for Girls was accredited its very first year, and both camps have successfully navigated the rigorous ACA reaccreditation process every three years since.

# The Case for Camp Susquehannock

## The Capital Campaign

The Camp Susquehannock, Inc. capital campaign, *Susquehannock—the Next 100 Years*, was publicly announced at the Susquehannock BUFFet in November, 2003. At that time, the Board of Trustees declared that the campaign was in the early stage of formation, and the Board members had personally committed over \$100,000 toward the ultimate goal of \$1.5 million. The funds being raised have been and will be utilized to refurbish and rehabilitate the physical plants of both camps as well as add additional structures to enhance the summer experiences of our campers.

As of this writing, \$214,000 has been pledged or contributed for this effort, primarily from a handful of passionate alums and from foundations committed to Susquehannock's mission. The campaign will soon be kicking into higher gear as we approach the 100-year anniversary of Camp Susquehannock. As we enter this next stage of the campaign, we need your support and hope you personally will be receptive and responsive, and also will encourage your fellow alums to give generously. The campaign is co-chaired by **Bernie Lemonick '50** and **Jonathan Price '64**, while our living legend (**Buff Weigand '48**) is the honorary chairman.

Capital improvements will be made on exciting projects such as a sorely needed indoor athletic facility at S4B and new tennis courts at S4G, as well as on more mundane needs like new mattresses, kitchen equipment, and roof replacements. The Board has identified approximately 100 of these current and future needs.

There are lots of exciting things taking place at Camp Susquehannock. In 2004, the number of new campers more than doubled, and we experienced a 65% return rate from prior year campers. This well above the 50% average reported in ACA statistics. Please consider joining us and becoming a part of the campaign for the next 100 years at Susquehannock. 
As the campaign moves forward, we will keep you apprised of our progress. It is our hope that you will join our efforts to launch Susquehannock into the next 100 years.





He was elected twice to the borough council, was Hamburg Civil Service commissioner from 1941–1949, past president of the Rotary Club of Hamburg, and a director of the Hamburg Savings & Trust Bank for more than 40 years. Bill outlived two wives. Three nephews survive him.




