
## From the President, Board of Directors, Andrew Thalheimer



## In the Trenches with the Executive Director, Dave Williams



Our family surveys show that over 70% of our campers learned about camp through our alumni and current campers. When you think about it, it makes sense. Those that have benefited from the camp experience are more than willing to share that experience with others. The memories of camp remain with us for our entire lives. The centennial celebrations of last spring and summer provided an opportunity for many alumni to share their personal stories and camp memories. It struck me, as I listened to various people reminisce, that our strong camp program, put in place so many years ago, has retained the key core elements while evolving with the times.

I have seen many camping programs move toward weekly specialty camps, offering high tech toys and other goodies to entice children to join. Many of these camps are learning that the more their programs move away from the traditional camp experience, the more unfulfilling the camp experience becomes for the camper. ## SUSQUEHANNOCK CAMPS Receive Perfect Score in ACA Accreditation

The America Camp Association accreditation is considered to be the “gold standard” for measuring the quality of summer camps. ACA Accreditation means that Camp Susquehannock for Boys (S4B) and Camp Susquehannock for Girls (S4G) submitted to a thorough (over 300 standards) review of its operation by the American Camp Association (ACA) — from staff qualifications, training and program to organization and emergency management. American Camp Association collaborates with experts from The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Red Cross, and other youth service agencies to assure that current practices at the camps reflect the most up-to-date, research-based standards in camp operation. S4B, S4G and ACA form a partnership that promotes summers of growth and fun in an environment committed to safety.



While ACA accreditation is voluntary, meeting ACA standards helps accredited camps provide: healthy, developmentally-appropriate activities and learning experiences, discovery through experiential education, caring and competent role models, service to the community and the environment and opportunities for leadership and personal growth.

Each member camp undergoes the accreditation process every three years and this past summer both S4B and S4G were scheduled to be evaluated.




A steering committee comprised of CSI Board member Jon Kulp, Executive Director Dave Williams and Site Directors Win Shafer, Cannie Shafer and Tarryn Rosen led the two camps through the extensive process of self-study followed by visitation by two evaluators from ACA. The time spent and the volumes of materials that had to be compiled for examination were extraordinary (many many hours and five, large 3-ring binders of documentation). In spite of the workload, it was a wonderfully affirming experience because both camps earned a score of 100% compliance on every mandatory standard and relevant non-mandatory standards. Camp operations are in excellent shape to begin our next 100 years.


## COMING SOON! SUSQUEHANNOCK'S FIRST 100 YEARS!!

A full history of Camp Susquehannock 1905-2005 and the story of George Carlton Shafer, the founder, is nearly ready. This 300-page hardcover book will be full of stories of campers and staff over the decades and include many photographs from the earliest days through last summer. It has been written by Dede Shafer and will be published by Harrowood Books. Dede has collected much memorabilia over the years, and has included the recollections of King Shafer's children - Edwin, George and their sister, Marnie. Marnie's husband, Charlie Saunders, an author of several books himself, has helped to edit the manuscript. CSI Board Members have provided information on the more recent history. The book will be published on April 28th, 2006.



We loved having an expanded weight room attached to the front of the current Arts/Crafts building near the Office. We had great trips in the first half which took the Juniors on a Science based day trip, the Intermediates to the Adirondacks for a hiking and rafting adventure and the Seniors on a longer trip to Lake George where they enjoyed white water rafting as well as some other "fun park" activities! We had a Sunday morning service and gathering down at the Lake in the restored "lakeside amphitheater" before our July 4<sup>th</sup> Field Day. We also enjoyed Chicken feeds, "Smitty" in the kitchen, campfires and overnights, S4G World Olympics, canoe trips, Challenge Course and Tower experiences, and tennis tournaments that were our own or ones we joined in Binghamton. Our CIT's did their tradition of learning how to bring in a hay cutting. Our Srs./LIT's and CIT's participated for the second year in the Relay For Life Cancer Walk held in Montrose with S4G. ## **Our Miracle Has Arrived....!!**

*Announcing the arrival of Seth Larson Rozen, January 6<sup>th</sup> 2006, 6lbs 1 oz.*

We want to thank all of you who have been providing us with endless support and prayers during this difficult pregnancy. You all helped us save our little boy and we will never be able to thank you enough for that.

For those of you who have not heard the story, the details were thus:

During the 2005 camp season, Eric and I discovered I was pregnant with our second child. There was great excitement at camp over this announcement and everyone expected to see our bouncing baby in summer 2006. At 21 weeks of pregnancy, we were given a rude awaking!

My water broke on October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2005 and after consulting our doctor, we were told I would likely not be able to carry the baby to term. Eric and I spent two days in shock and hours wondering, "What went wrong?" News traveled fast and we were receiving calls and prayers from all over the world. Each communication made us more positive and we began to believe we could save our child. We began doing research and getting educated on the issues we were facing. A few success stories helped bolster our resolve. Due to the high risk of the pregnancy, I was told to get in bed and stay there and all we could do was wait.



At 24 weeks, I was admitted into hospital. At this point, if the baby came, he had a 50% chance of survival. My mother came over from South Africa to help Eric and Dara be able to keep up a "normal" routine and the three of them visited me almost daily in the hospital. Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukah, New Year ... all in hospital.

Then 13 weeks after the rupture and 10 weeks in the hospital, my doctor decided the time had come. At 7:30am on Friday the 6<sup>th</sup> of January, we agreed I was going in for a C-section - within 30 minutes of this decision, I went into labor. By 1:35pm, Seth was born. *(above- Seth a few days old attached to tubes)*



Seth arrived into this world as a very big boy for his age and appeared strong and healthy. Despite his lungs and heart having some serious problems at first, he is well on his way to health. He was released home on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January and we have had days of pure joy at having him home. Dara is enamored of her baby brother and declares constantly that he is "so cute". Eric is just grateful to have us both home and healthy. We have been blessed with many friends and family that called, sent cards and gifts, e-mailed, visited and were simply just there for us, and that's what got us through this all. *(left- Seth at 2.5 weeks)*

We are unfortunately not going to be at camp this summer. We need to take a leave of absence to keep our little boy healthy and just spend some time regrouping as a family. Although camp is a wonderful place, it is not time to introduce Seth to its daily routine just yet.

Thank you all again, and remember: positive thinking and love from others can certainly lead to miracles.

## A Note from John Pufky, *Interim Site Director, Camp Susquehannock for Girls*:




# Hundreds Help Camp Susquehannock Celebrate its Centennial !


Plenty of memorabilia was on display including a wonderful slide show featuring camp and its campers over the last 100 years.

Since some of our friends from abroad couldn't make the long trip, Elaine Johnson and Jo Stewart arranged a satellite celebration in Manchester England on May 21st.











# Mid-Summer Reunion



During a short program, Pennsylvania State Representative Sandra Major presented CSI with a citation honoring the 100th anniversary. Another citation from Pennsylvania Governor Ed Rendell was read citing Susquehannock's Century of service to youth.

I was recently approached by a board member and asked to write a brief article about the value of Camp's Scholarship program. Since I feel strongly about the impact the program has had on my life, and have a great deal of respect for the Board member who made the request, I agreed to put some of my thoughts and feelings about this issue into writing.

I was seven years old when Mr. George came to visit my parents and me. He introduced himself to me and asked me my interests (all of which seemed to be sports), described what camp had to offer, and showed us a camp video (the one with Win's infamous mustache). Everyone seemed to agree that camp was a great fit for me. However, when the conversation turned to finances, it became immediately clear that my family could not afford to pay the full camp rates for the summer. The Shafers decided to take a chance on me and allowed my family to take advantage of the

scholarship fund. So in June of 1990, my parents dropped their hyperactive seven year old off for 8 weeks of run rabbit run, C-duty, and buddy checks. I cried and cried those first two nights, and 8 weeks later I cried again when I had to leave.

Since then I have returned every summer to the place I affectionately call "home". I do not simply repeat this mantra because Buff says it to me every summer when I return. I call it home because when my family moved over and over and over again as I grew up, Camp, and all the people I love there, stayed right where it was. And I knew that no matter what happened from September to May, in June everything was going to be back to normal, if only for a few months.

Camp has given every scholarship kid the opportunity to learn life's most valuable lessons (trust, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship, and more) in a safe, loving environment, and has given us some of the most special memories of our childhood. I am laughing to myself about many of them right now as I write this (Beef's fireside speeches for one). I hope that everyone in the camp family, old and new members, can appreciate the importance of the Scholarship program and support its continued existence. Thank you.

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

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


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## STAFF, CAMPER, AND ALUMNI NEWS


