






Remembering Dr. Peter Cubberley '83

Dr. Peter Cubberley, beloved member of the Susquehannock family for the past 25 years, passed away January 2, 2008. Two friends offer remembrances.

Make yourself appear as big as you can and scream “Bear, Bear.” These words (and accompanying demonstration) will be fondly remembered by campers and staff for many years. They were spoken by Dr. Peter Cubberley during his welcoming health, safety, and nature talk. Dr. Cubberley dedicated his last ten summers to camp. Prior to becoming full time resident camp physician, he was a camper, and then camp physician for the first half. In total, he had 26 years with Camp Susquehannock.

In Peter's early years as camp physician, he was still employed as a full-time physician with one of the first HMOs in the country. Additionally, Peter was a life long volunteer at the Free Clinic of Greater Cleveland. Upon retiring from his full time job, he became the Executive Director of the Free Clinic and was instrumental in raising the money to build a new multi-million dollar facility. Even while serving as Executive Director, he continued to treat patients. At the time of his retirement he was the primary physician for hundreds of AIDS survivors.

Peter was a remarkable man, who despite his professional obligations, enjoyed nature and the out of doors. With all but one of his children grown and out of the house, he convinced his wife Martha and daughter Amy to spend part of their summers at Camp Susquehannock. That first summer as a family, convinced them all they were at their home away from home. Peter loved his role as camp physician and was very involved in every aspect of the camp health program. If questions arose, he would spend time researching and handling even the most unusual of problems with expert care.

Camp afforded Peter the opportunity to pursue his other interests. For many years, he arose early to take a morning dip and “soap up.” On sunny days, he would spend time at the guest dock and read and swim. If it was too hot, he would sit on his porch that he always decorated with beautiful hanging baskets of flowers, and read or listen to NPR and slip in a little nap – the nap part was usually carefully concealed behind a large book! Mornings often found Peter out hiking and looking for ferns. He studied ferns and admitted that his choice was based on the fact that there were few enough of them that he could feel like he had a good grasp of them. Despite his extensive knowledge of ferns, he knew other plants and always took the job of locating the patches of poison ivy on camp property and telling campers and staff where it was. Peter also sprayed poison ivy that was along frequented paths.

Peter loved physical activity and exercised each day at the gym in his condominium complex, where he also served as president of the Resident organization. At camp, he swam, hiked, and loved to play tennis. Campers and staff alike knew when he had just come off the tennis court, because he could be seen in his really old, too short, tennis shorts. They were a classic, just like him!

Peter's last few years at camp were extra special to him. Martha was no longer joining him for the whole summer, as her calendar was filled with trips, attending Cleveland Indian games, and family obligations. Peter and Martha's grandchildren, Jesse and Carly were the oldest and attended camp for the most years. More recently, Erika, Nile, and Jace attended. Erika and Jace were with him for the summer of 2007 and he was especially delighted to see Jace fall in love with camp.

Peter will be missed by all who knew him. Camp was only one aspect of his very rich life, but it was something he loved. Peter had hoped to spend many more summers settled in the cottage at the edge of Tripp Lake. Camp was fortunate to have Dr. Peter Cubberley donate his summers so unselfishly. Thank you, Peter.

Peter was my hiking buddy, usually an afternoon hike, after infirmary calls. He was interested in everything outdoors so we investigated everything, from holes in rock outcroppings to flowers, mushrooms and birds. If neither of us recognized something he'd shrug off his backpack and get out the appropriate field guide for identification. Sometimes large holes also needed more intense study with a field guide to help identify the scatterings of scat about them. We found fox dens, raccoon and porcupine trees, saw plenty of bear signs but never saw the bear we so earnestly sought.

Ferns and non-flowering plants were Peter's specialty. He explained that the fern field guide was the smallest and he figured he could get that one down cold. He did, too.... there wasn't a fern or club-moss in Susquehanna county that he didn't know, and most of the ones I recognize today are the result of his tutelage.

We have hiked all the hills, for miles around Camp: the Pines and Three Rocks and beyond; the outlet creek and the quarry and beyond - only needed to be back in time for supper. Peter often hiked alone during camp and so knew the forests and landmarks well. He knew where we were and how long it would take to get back to camp – except once. That hike began at the quarry, on a cloudy day with no Sun for directions. We got totally turned around bushwhacking through the woods and finally realized we had no idea where we were. Systematic exploring brought us to a path of sorts that then lead to a dirt road. Down the road a bit was a house where we learned we were past Camp Iroquoina! A phone call brought a rescue that got us back only a teeny bit late for supper.

After that time I carried a compass on our hikes!

I shall miss hiking with Peter at Camp and sharing such curiosity and quiet appreciation of the natural world.




Susquehannock for Girls Site Director's Report 2007







I come back for the people.

This is one of the most commonly uttered phrases at Camp Susquehannock. It is also a very true expression for both campers and counselors. I, too, have said those words on many occasions, meaning them every time.

Camp Susquehannock for Girls and Boys is located in Brackney, Pennsylvania, which some would consider to be just about the middle of nowhere. The nearest Wal-Mart is a thirty-minute drive; the nearest place to find consistent cell phone service is still farther away.

I started going to Camp Susquehannock with my brother and sister the summer of 1998. I was eight years old, with bangs, knobby knees and a gap between my two front teeth. Even after that first summer—which I can barely remember now—I didn’t really have any idea what camp would come to mean to me.



Shortly after my third summer at Susquehannock, and completely unexpectedly, my father died. My father, who wrote me countless letters asking about my counselors, my field hockey clinics, my swimming lessons and my friends. My father, who had shown up at the end of camp every year with his video camera at the ready to record whatever end-of-the-year dance or play we had to show him. My father, who loved the camp because *we* loved it, was gone.

That following summer I chose to go back, without my brother and sister, who had chosen to spend their summers on a biking trip and at a theatre camp respectively. I was nervous; I had not been homesick the previous years, but I had also had my siblings—and I also had the promise of my dad *and* my mom at the end of camp. This year, I just had one.

That summer was, as my mother likes to call it, my healing summer. I was able to grieve for my father at camp in a way that I hadn’t been able to do at home. My friends sat with me on the swing set outside of

our cabin for hours, comforting me as I worked through everything. I swam the lake upwards of ten times with one of my closest friends, who seemed to “get it” better than anyone at home. It just seemed natural to do the work of grief at camp, more natural than at home. It wasn’t the place that made it possible, it was the people. Or maybe it was both.



Susquehannock would not win any awards for being flashy or fashionable—and this is, really, what I love about it. Unlike the MTV-style, 3-day thrill, forget-me-quick adventure camps that are found all across the country, Susquehannock is unabashedly old-fashioned and tradition-based. Though single-sport camps are increasingly popular, Camp Susquehannock remains a camp where kids learn as many sports as they can, from volleyball to European handball, soccer to Buffball, field hockey to Angleball, softball to Home Run Derby. In the past ten years (yes, I have been going to

this camp for a decade), I have played and coached them all, some better than others—and that's the point. It's not about becoming the best at one sport, but about being comfortable with your own skill (or lack thereof) in all.

At camp, people see me—the good, the bad, and the ugly (which, after an overnight, can be very ugly indeed). My camp friends have seen me crying, laughing and yelling. They have taught me that it's okay to be all of the above—sometimes, all at once. It's okay to be sentimental. It's okay to give your heart completely to people. They will love you back.

I come back for the climbing tower, the campsites, and the bunk beds. I come back for the brownies, the bug juice, and the s'mores. I come back for the Swimming Regatta, the Decathlon, and Buffball clinics. I come back for all of these things, and countless other reasons, but more than anything else, I come back for the people. And, I'd like to think, they come back for me.

Early Sports Specialization Not Recommended

- Specialization in sports at an early age is becoming more common...
- But experts say this may actually be detrimental to performance at a later age.



Ages 6 to 13 have been called "sampling years," a time when children should participate in a variety of sports just for fun.

Athletic skills such as speed, balance, mental focus, jumping and reacting are all stressed differently in different sports. These athletic skills will later transfer to the child's primary activity, so everything a child does to become a better all-around athlete will make the child a better specialized player.


BOB PARTRIDGE, “MR. P.” HAS GONE

One of the greatest camp supporters and leaders, Robert Woodrow Partridge, left us on May 4, 2007. “Mr. P.” as he was affectionately known, came to camp in 1953, and became Head of the Junior Camp from 1958-1986.

Bob Partridge came to Camp Susquehannock when he was teaching in the history department at Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre. Hal Thatcher, Head of the History Department at that time, and longtime Susquehannock tutor, recommended Bob to King Shafer. Bob was a natural for Susquehannock. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania where he was captain of the varsity soccer team and played varsity baseball. He was named an All-American soccer player in 1940. After five years as an officer in the Navy in World War II, Bob accepted the position on the Wilkes College staff. Later he moved to the Kent School, Kent, CT, where he became their Director of Athletics and continued to teach history and coach baseball and soccer.

The Junior Camp staff was devoted to Bob and he set a fine example for them. He developed a very strong *esprit de corps* with tremendous positive energy. Bob told his staff that if they ever heard him swear, they would have permission to do the same, and there was little if any profanity. He had a great sense of humor and loved to use “fractured French” in his counselor meetings. His love of baseball, both playing on the Camp Varsity Team and teaching the sport to his young campers led to his singing, “Take Me Out to the Ball Game”, which became his own “trademark” song, sung whenever and wherever he and his devoted followers gathered. Empathetic, an easy listener, and a low-key but always fair leader, Bob earned the respect of all who knew him.




Bob and his wife, Louise, moved to Ocala, Florida, after his retirement, but more recently moved back to the Philadelphia area to be near his children, Glenn and Carol. He stayed in touch with Buff Weigand over the years and they played tennis together as often as possible. Bob was still organizing luncheons or dinners several times a year for a few of the Old Guard of camp in the Philadelphia area until last spring – including Buff, the Kulp's, the Youngs and the George Shafer's.

Bob Partridge was 88 years old when he died. A memorial service was held at the Episcopal Academy Devon campus on May 8, 2007. To Louise, Glenn and Carol, and his grandchildren, we all send our condolences and deepest sympathy. We will miss him.

Camp Family Mourns Passing of S. Hamill Horne

We were saddened by the passing on November 24th of S. Hamill Horne, the former director of Camp Choconut and a CSI Board member. "Ham" as he was known to many, grew up in Bryn Mawr and was a graduate of Episcopal Academy. He attended the University of Virginia before receiving a bachelor's degree from the University of Pennsylvania and a Masters of Social Service Degree in 1959.



After spending many years as a camper and counselor at Camp Choconut in the 1930s, 40s, and 50s, Ham and his wife Lee reopened Camp Choconut in Friendsville, PA in 1960. After their divorce, Ham continued as executive director until his retirement and camp's closing in 1985. His connections with Choconut remained strong, and he was an active member in the Choconut Lake Cemetery Association, and a leader and supporter of the Camp Choconut Foundation. Founded in 1896, Camp Choconut has a long history, and in 2005 he published: *Camp Choconut: A History of the Boy's Camp near Friendsville, Pennsylvania*. When the camp reopened in 2007, he provided guidance and support to the new director and staff.

Ham's other passions included genealogy, local history, and local cultural and civic associations in Gladwyne and Merion, and he served on a number of related boards.


trying out all the roller coaster rides! The Rozens keep in contact and frequently see many camp alumni...too many to mention here.


Ken Buergin's Wilderness Prize, circa 1976


