The Who's Who in Orange and Blue is a publication for all campers, alumni, parents and friends of The Susquehannock Camps.


From the President's Desk by Allan Shafer '70

In Memoriam

In Memory: George C. Shafer Jr.

December 22, 1929 – April 5, 2016

It is with a heavy heart that we mourn the passing of **George Carlton Shafer, Jr. '36**, known fondly to many generations of campers and staff as "Mr. George."

After assuming the directorship of Susquehannock for Boys, Mr. George and his brother Mr. Ed (**Edwin H. Shafer '34**) oversaw the administration of the program for decades. In 1986, George and his wife **Dede Shafer '54** opened a sister camp, Camp Susquehannock for Girls at Lake Choconut in Friendsville, PA where they served as directors. After 41 years of service, Mr. George retired in 2000 but continued to spend every summer of his life at the camp founded by his father in 1905. Mr. George's unfailing devotion to the ideals espoused by his father "King" Shafer was influential in the development of countless individuals and the establishment of Susquehannock as a leading educational institution.

Mr. George's spirit and legacy will continue to be enduring and inspirational at Susquehannock.



Mr. George is survived by his wife **Louise Sayre Hoopes ("Dede") '54**, and four children, **G. Carlton Shafer III '62** (Cindy) of Lancaster, PA; **Catherine Cockerill '76** (Jim) of Thornton, PA; **Priscilla "Polly" Dana '77** (John) of Boulder, CO; and **Elizabeth Nagy '97** (Rob) of Lawrenceville, NJ, and seven grandchildren, **Jessica Cockerill '92**, **Amy Cockerill '94**, **George Shafer '03**, **James Shafer '06**, **Nathan Dana '98**, **Henry Dana '99** and Charlotte Nagy.

A funeral service was held on **Saturday, April 16th at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church**. In lieu of flowers, gifts may be made in George Shafer's name to the Scholarship Fund of Camp Susquehannock (att: Camp Susquehannock Inc., 2308 Tripp Lake Road, Brackney, PA 18812) or donate [here](#).



Tim Kent '73 shared this message about his father's passing the day Tom died:

Dear Friends,

This mortal world, alas, has lost one of it's most noble and beloved competitors. Tom Kent, earlier this morning, accepted a special once-in-a-lifetime invitation to compete in the Post-Mortem Classic, an interstellar tournament run by St. Peter and his heavenly compatriots. While many of the details of this tournament are unknown, it is rumored to be an ethereal blend of tennis, squash and paddle, and that upon entering this event, participants are given, free of charge, new knees, hips, elbows (...and indeed any other appendage that may have worn out over time,) and that these new replacements are guaranteed to last an eternity. Despite having to leave his friends and family behind for a bit, Tom was thrilled at the opportunity to get back on court once again and noted that he's looking forward to reconnecting with so many of his former friends and rivals.

Tom's association with Camp Susquehannock began in 1948, followed by his sons and all his grandchildren. In all, the Kent clan have spent more than 200 summers at Susquehannock.

Directors' Corner

Dear Camp Family,

We are made of our yesterdays, todays *and* the hopes of our tomorrows. This year marks the 100th Anniversary of the US National Parks official foundation. President Theodore Roosevelt's beliefs inspired "King" Shafer's initiative to start a sports and outdoors-related "summer camp" in his beloved native northeastern Pennsylvania. This is also Susquehannock's 111th season and we will all celebrate our mission again this coming summer, built on the importance of relationships, community and our natural environment!

Last summer was another terrific season, crowned by a successful 110th Anniversary Homecoming weekend that encompassed alumni and friends of Camp. We continue to have homegrown staffs in both the girls' and the boys' camps. Campers grow through the summers to become CITs, Junior Counselors and eventually Cabin Counselors and Senior Staff members. We are lucky to have new staff, including medical, kitchen and maintenance, who are introduced each year, usually through recommendations from other Camp people! Each year new games, crazy Camp gear, cheers, songs and program activities get rolled into the tradition of being able to come together at Tripp Lake. We also remain committed to being "unplugged" from all of our distracting electronics while together at Camp, so we can simply enjoy the comradery of a pick-up game, a walk in the woods or a paddle across Tripp Lake with a Camp friend.

Last summer in a joint S4G/S4B Sunday service, we shared some thoughts about living a balanced life, which in current times might mean finding the balance between being a specialist as well as being a generalist. Many of us value our time spent at Susquehannock because, despite the fact that many of us come with specific skill sets and interests, we have the opportunity at Camp to try a host of new activities and sports. These opportunities frequently inspire new passions or are simply fun!

Here is some of the text shared:

“Today there is much written and argued about, for colleges, as well as some high school programs, becoming more and more specialized for specific careers and jobs. There is an increased focus away from the liberal arts or classical style education. Some will ask, what good is it to have to read and to learn all of that general information? When you need it, ya’ just “Google” it!

The original ethos of education was to prepare people for citizenship, for enlightened leadership and to enhance creativity. The founders of our country believed that this style of education was the core of our democracy. The worry can be that if we lose having a well-educated population, we will suffer as a society. ...Here is a wonderful quote from writer and poet Ralph Waldo Emerson, “Life is a journey not a destination.” Our education and our life experiences are about the journey, not just about reaching the destination or acquiring the large amount of content! Our true education is about the process of exposure, and the breadth of our connections.



Current brain research promotes the real neuroscience behind making those connections. It is about the exposure to different thoughts, cultures, languages, value systems which allows us to see and to understand and to imagine the possibilities of human potential. A general education trains us each to think and allows us to choose special areas of interest. We would say to you, try to be both-be a generalist, and a specialist when you can.

Emerson didn't say this quote but we think he would have totally agreed with it! It reminds us that there are times in life when "you can't see the forest for the trees." It simply means that if you are too focused on something or too close or too involved with a situation...like studying individual trees, no matter how beautiful they might be, if you do not push yourself to see more... like all those other trees around you; you cannot see the enormity of the whole forest. You might never know that the trees you were examining were only a part of such a large and magnificent forest!

Camp provides the opportunity to all who come, to find their potential, explore their potential and use your potential. Often, it is the simplicity of this place and this opportunity, as King Shafer wanted, to live outdoors and be in a special community."

We hope you will stay in touch and visit Tripp Lake whenever you can. Our mission is strong and remains important. Our tomorrows are promising with your support to continue the Susquehannock spirit!


Important Note to Alumni

Every year we have a past camper or staff member contact Camp to ask if they can come visit and volunteer their services. This is usually something we try to accommodate if we can, but as of 2015, Pennsylvania Child Protective Laws have changed and as a result, these visits will take a lot more planning.

In order for a volunteer to be at Camp when campers are there and work directly with the campers, the volunteer will need to acquire 3 state approved clearances. These clearances can take weeks to come through. Thus, if you are planning a visit to Camp this summer, please make sure you contact us at least 4 weeks in advance, so we can approve the visit and walk you through the clearance process. If you do not contact Camp in advance, we will unfortunately have to turn down your request.

NOTE: These clearances do not apply to Work Week volunteers because there are no campers present during Work Week.

A True Net Asset


CSI alum referred to: **George Shafer (Mr. George) '36, Whit Powell '86, Tim Kent '73, and Win Shafer '65**

Episcopal Academy tennis coaches Whit Powell and Tim Kent's life-long love of the sport was cultivated by George C. Shafer, Hon., decades ago on a red clay court at Camp Susquehannock summer camp.

"George Shafer taught me not just how to hold and swing a racket, but how to analyze and orchestrate a point," Kent says. "He's a master strategist and brilliant tactician, and he helped me understand all dimensions of the game."

Middle School science teacher Win Shafer had a similar a-ha moment when his uncle George worked with him on his backhand on that same court.

"He had the uncanny ability to see what you needed to improve in your strokes and to explain to you in an easily understandable way what you needed to do to get better," Win Shafer said. "I remember a time in the summer at Camp Susquehannock, where he was the director along with my father, that he helped me with my backhand. In a matter of a few minutes, he had me hitting backhand ground strokes better than I had ever done—by far."



Although clearly saddened by the fact that Shafer is battling cancer, both Powell and Kent chuckled when recalling Shafer's summertime tutorials on how to nail down lines on the red clay court with tacks, a process that should have taken an hour but took much longer due to the combination of Shafer's attention to detail and his gift for storytelling.

"It ended up taking all day, and even then Mr. George was not satisfied," Powell said, smiling. "Mr. George was thorough and detailed in his approach to education and, more specifically, teaching the game of tennis. There was a right and there was a wrong, no in between."

Shafer's life lessons positively influenced hundreds of Episcopal Academy students and Camp Susquehannock campers over his decades of coaching. He was a member of the inaugural Episcopal Sports Hall of Fame Class in 2000 and serves on the induction committee. Shafer coached tennis, swimming and football at EA and also played a role in assisting Kent, Powell and his nephew Win secure teaching jobs at Episcopal—thus positively impacting countless other EA students.

"EA won lots of (tennis) titles under his guidance, but I should point out that Episcopal was known above all for its doubles," Kent says. "George could take players of mediocre talent and form them into a truly effective doubles pairing. And many Inter-Ac titles were won by pulling out victories at that last third doubles spot."

Of all of the tennis doubles teams that the camel-haired blazer and bow tie-wearing Shafer formed, the most enduring one was Kent and Powell, two members of his coaching tree who replaced him and have continued his legacy. Kent took over for Shafer in 1999 and Powell joined the staff in 2001—meaning that either George Shafer or one of his disciples has coached the EA tennis team for nearly 65 years.

"TK (Tim Kent) was the natural replacement. How does one replace a legend? Well, you replace a legend with his student," Powell said. "In those early years, TK channeled his inner-George, even tying the boys together with an extra large jump rope to demonstrate the value of moving as one cohesive doubles team. He spoke about team, togetherness, and honor. I listened and learned every step of the way."

The George Shafer coaching tree has had quite an impact at Episcopal.

"It is perfectly evident that Tim Kent and Whit Powell are disciples of George Shafer; and our tennis programs are a reflection of this thriving culture," Episcopal Academy Athletic Director Gina Buggy says. "Tim and Whit would be the first to tell you how powerfully they have been impacted by the mentorship of someone as special as George Shafer."

Powell is quick to acknowledge all that he has learned from Shafer and Kent.

“The first face on my Mount Rushmore of coaching is, and will always be, Mr. George Shafer. Not for the titles he’s won, or the honors he’s received, but for the values he’s taught me and the integrity in which he lived his life,” Powell said.

“And TK (Tim Kent) has taught me more about life through tennis than anyone. How fortunate was I, a 21-year-old kid, to learn from two legends. Working side by side with TK the past 14 years has been one of the greatest honors of my life. I have learned how to be a better teacher, coach, man, father, husband under his tutelage.

“I’m not sure George or TK are fully aware of the lasting impact they have made on me.”

Since the spring of 2014, the Susquehannock community has been up to something truly special. Through generous volunteer efforts, either by donating time or money, community individuals have managed to help raise over \$67,000 for the Scholarship Fund through the Camp Susquehannock Alumni Challenge. Participants across generations have heeded the call to help preserve and share the Camp Susquehannock experience with over 22 young men and women who otherwise could not afford it.

The Alumni Challenge has served as an annual rallying cry for alumni of Camp Susquehannock. Following Camp's competitive spirit, the challenge

While reflecting on the Alumni Challenge, current senior staff member **Seth Brownold '94** said, "The fact that the Alumni Challenge has enabled us to reconnect former campers and counselors is an added bonus. It's been great to have these alumni come back to Camp in the summer, and we hope to see more new and old faces for summer 2016!"

When asked why he gives to Camp, alum **Drew Hamm '97** states, "I know it is trite to say Camp is where summer lasts a lifetime, but the fact that I'm invited to two weddings this fall after not setting foot on The Hill for nearly a decade proves it. The friendships and life skills I learned as a camper and counselor are irreplaceable and if I can help a child gain the same things, then I couldn't be happier or more honored to do so. 





It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of **Dr. Richard Whittaker '52**. Dr Whittaker was the Camp Susquehannock for Boys doctor and was described as an avid hiker, cyclist and lover of nature and songbirds. He was happiest spending time with his family on the farm he grew up on. Dr. Richard P. Whittaker, husband of Margaret (Peggy) Whittaker, died peacefully in the presence of loved ones at the Seasons Hospice, Phoenixville Hospital on February 26, 2016. He had been suffering from lung cancer, which was diagnosed in August of 2015. Dr. Whittaker will be remembered for his positive attitude; enthusiasm for life; and kind, generous nature. He served the Pottstown community as an orthopedic surgeon for almost forty years. 

Whilst looking at the internet, I was pleased to find this your camp page and remember my good time I had at the camp during the course of summer 1971.




