

Gratitude for these life-changing experiences is why I continue to give back to a place I cherish so much. As the alumni of S4B and S4G we have the responsibility to ensure children continue having a summer that "lasts a lifetime."

The first and most important way is to spread the word of Camp to other families or to send our own children: the experiences we had need to be shared! 

“One of my favorite parts of Camp is the climbing tower. Every time I climb I get a rush that goes all through my spine and leaves my head dizzy. I look out over the most beautiful camp and think about my next move on the tower....I look down and know that my counselor will always be there to help me up. Finally when I get to the top, I feel accomplished and then I get the reward of flying through the air on the zip-line.”

“We went to Salt Springs and waded in the stream and climbed the waterfalls with our counselors. The water felt good and cool on my feet. We made artwork with whatever we could find. We got there by a hayride and sang songs with our counselors on the way. Then we had a cookout and the counselors cooked great food.”

“One of my favorite things about Camp is clinics because they help you learn about different sports. They teach me how to be positive with my teammates. The counselors always find a way to teach me something new about all sports, even if I play some at home. My counselors boost my confidence, in sports you



"I learned that Camp was originally a farm. In the old days Camp grew all its vegetables and also animals and chickens and made ice cream! The counselor taught me about a community garden and I liked pulling the weeds. We grew a lot of things this summer like tomatoes, squash, zucchini and beans and we got to eat the food. It was my favorite thing."

Important Note to Alumni

Every year we receive a number of inquiries from former campers and staff members who would like to visit Camp and volunteer their services. We normally try to accommodate these requests, but recent changes to the Pennsylvania Child Protective Laws necessitate more preparation.

In order to be at Camp while campers are present and to work directly with children, the volunteer must first acquire three state-approved clearances. In some cases these clearance requests can take weeks to be processed. If you plan to visit Camp this summer, we ask that you contact us at least *four weeks in advance* so we can approve the visit and guide you through the clearance process.

Please note: These clearances do NOT apply to Work Week volunteers since campers will not be present. However, there is still paperwork that needs to be completed.

Nora Saunders '95 - Secretary





Since the spring of 2014, the Susquehannock community has been up to something truly special.
