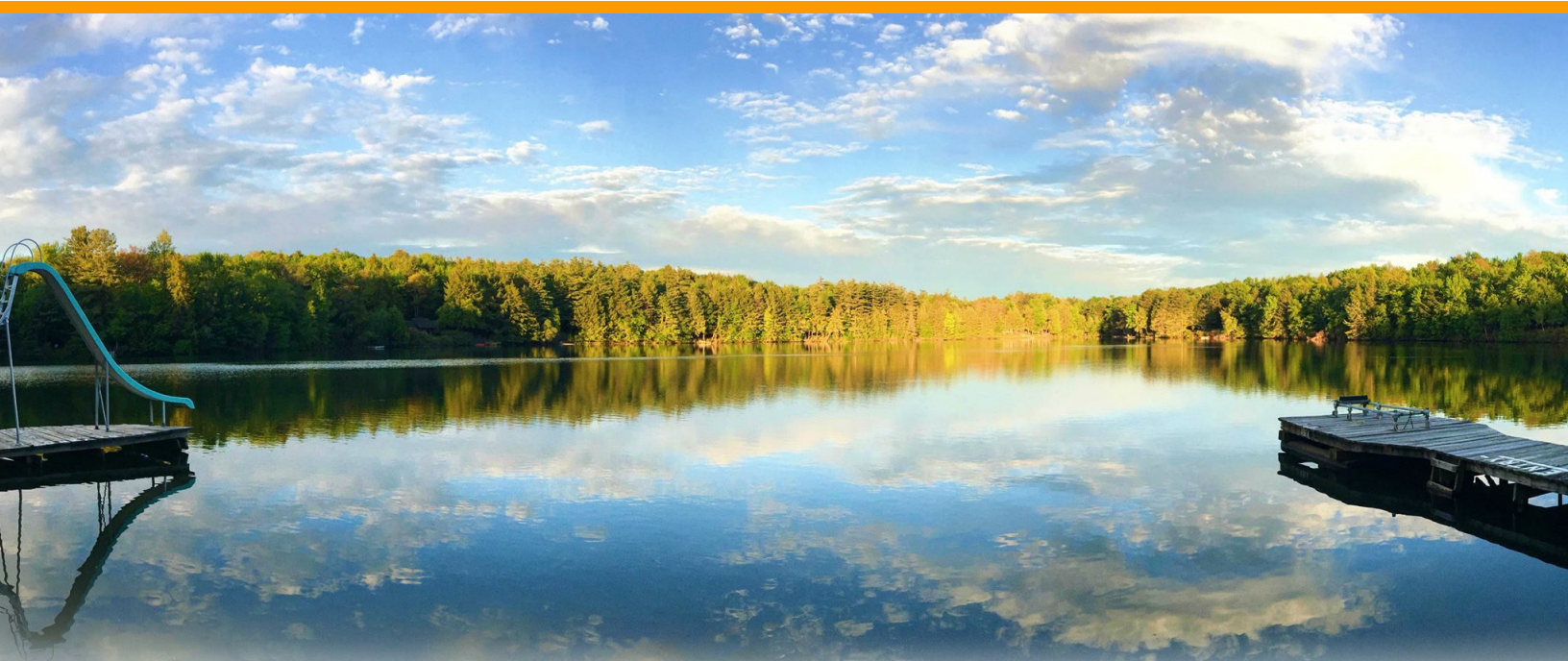

From *the* Director's Desk

Hello friends and family of Camp Susquehannock!

When I sat down to write this message, I was originally going to talk about the success we have had to date with the Campaign for Camp, our new dock, Basketball courts and the sponsorship dollars designated to send children to Camp. To those of you who have been so gracious with your donations, I want to say thank you - your support is greatly appreciated!

That said, it is important to share with you a conversation I recently had with one of our parents. This story describes the heart of our Camp. It represents the character, grit, determination, and work ethic Susquehannock is known for. It is a philosophy and mindset that began when camp was founded by George Carlton "King" Shafer in 1905.

As you might suspect, we have all been genuinely concerned with the COVID-19 pandemic and how it will affect Camp this summer. There have been countless meetings and many discussions regarding programming, operations, staffing and health. Needless to say, it has been a tremendous amount of additional work and planning.

Through it all, the staff and leadership team never blinked once or complained about the additional work or stress. Everyone simply jumped in and began working towards the goal of opening this summer, knowing full well there was always a possibility we would be prohibited from doing so.

While recently speaking with a parent about our plans to open, he stopped me in mid-sentence. He went on to tell me how impressed he was with the Camp's decision to try and open this summer.

He told me the easy thing to do in a situation like this would be to cancel the camp season. He said most organizations faced with this decision would simply take the easy way out and quit. To actually persevere through the pandemic would require hard work, new lines of thinking and risk that most organizations would simply choose not to undertake.



When I got off the phone, I thought about the conversation and how it related to what we teach at camp. We encourage children to challenge themselves, to persevere, to be gritty, to do things outside their comfort zone. We want them to be independent, resilient, high character young girls and boys.

This conversation confirmed that we, as a camp, made the correct decision to operate this summer. Camp Susquehannock has continued to operate despite polio, swine flu and a myriad of other challenges throughout our history. How could we possibly teach and instill moral fiber in children if we did not lead by example?

Our Board of Directors, Senior Staff and leadership team have never wavered in the decision or even once thought of giving up. We will do our best to operate a responsible, safe, and fun camp in 2020. We fully intend to open for our 115th summer unless the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania prohibits us from doing so.

I thank you all for your support and passion for Camp Susquehannock!

The State of Susquehannock

Summer #115

The team has been working hard in preparation for our 115th summer. The Governor of Pennsylvania recently announced Susquehanna County will begin opening on May 22, 2020 and we fully intend to operate this summer unless the commonwealth of Pennsylvania says otherwise.

We are continuing to work with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Pennsylvania state authorities, the American Camp Association, and our own Medical staff to ensure camp is as safe as possible for the upcoming summer. Once we get all campers on campus, we believe our unique location and ability to isolate from the general population will enable us to provide a safe environment.

One thing we must do is limit the number of outside visitations to camp. Historically we have operated two 3.5-week sessions, which meant there were four camper arrival/pick-up dates during the summer. To operate in this fashion under the current circumstances would pose a risk we do not need to take.

As a result, we have decided to operate one 4-week session for the summer of 2020. Our staff will arrive on campus June 20, 2020 and quarantine for two weeks prior to the arrival of the campers. **The 2020 summer session will begin on July 5, 2020 and end on August 2, 2020.** We realize this may not be ideal for everyone and hope you understand these are unique times that require unique adjustments.

Tuition for the one 4-week session will remain the same as our normal 3.5-week sessions. If you have already registered for the seven-week Full Season option, please know you have the option to have us refund the proportionate amount, roll that payment toward summer 2021, or convert those dollars to a charitable donation to benefit Camp Susquehannock.

We intend to make this summer a wonderful experience for the campers. These children need some normalcy in their lives and we intend to provide it!

Please keep your eyes open for upcoming announcements and procedures as it relates to camper drop-offs, pick-ups, transportation, visitation guidelines, health, and safety regulations.

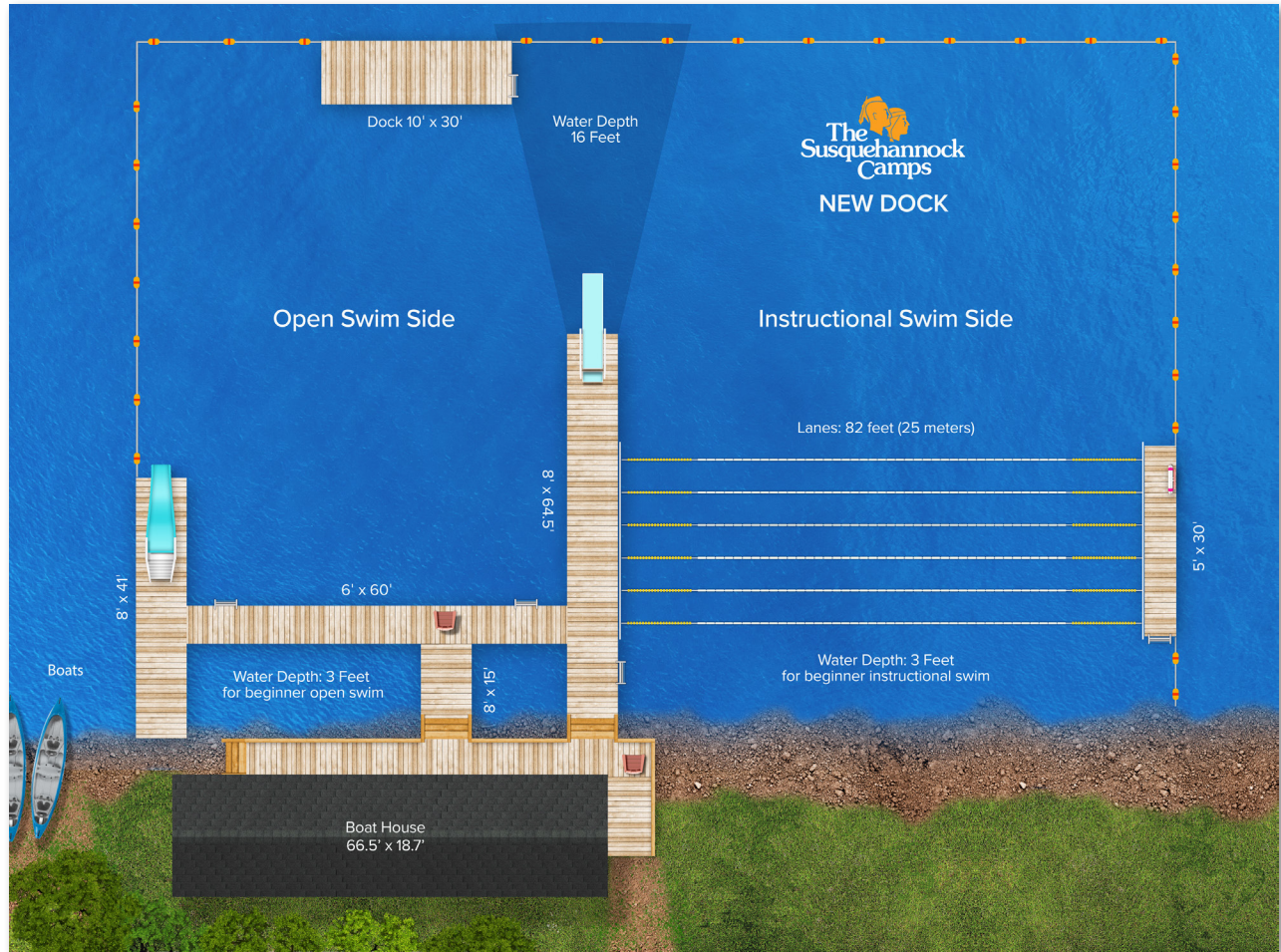

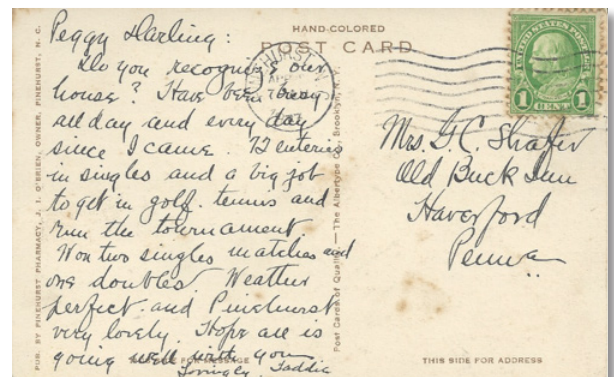
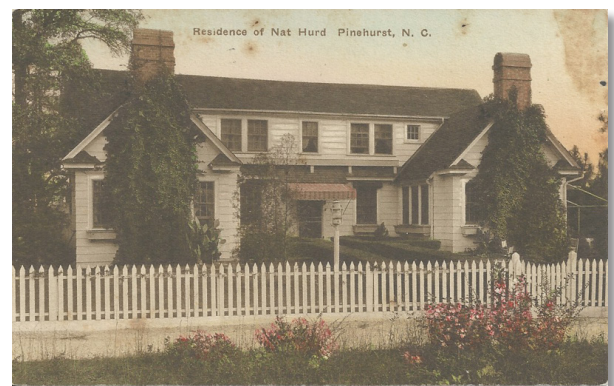


King Shafer's Home Reaches One Hundred Years Old!

When he married in 1917, Camp Susquehannock had been running successfully for 12 years. Initially, he brought his wife, Margaret, "Peggy", to live in a simple wood structure similar to the post office on the hill. Since he wanted to stay at camp till November each fall, he soon felt the need of a tighter, more substantial residence. He had his first home moved down the hill to become the Lower Junior Camp Lodge. Then he had the present house built on the same ridge, with a good view of the lake in front, and across the valley behind.

This house was much tighter, much warmer, and more formal, with fireplaces in several rooms. The walls were paneled, the floors polished, handsome furnishings from Margaret's Baltimore family installed, oriental rugs put down and paintings hung. It had a large living room, dining room, kitchen and porches in front and in the rear. Upstairs were two bedrooms and bathroom, and an area separated by a screen at the top of the stairway for over flow. There was a small room for babies off the master bedroom to accommodate his growing family. He had two tin-lined closets installed to prevent mice or other wildlife from eating clothing and bedding.

George Carlton Shafer, known as "King", married Margaret "Peggy" MacIntire in 1917, and, in 1920, built the home where our director, Jeff Bell, lives now. He modeled it after a house he admired in Pinehurst, NC. From a post card he mailed to his wife:

Here he and Margaret could stay comfortably till Thanksgiving. They entertained often during and after the camp season. During the camp season, four or five card tables could be placed in the living room for bridge after dessert was served. This was a favorite and serious sport among the staff, especially the tutors.

Later King had an annex built across a breezeway, mainly to house Margaret's visiting friends and family. This had a living area with stove for heat. When his son Edwin, and Anne Shafer were married, they lived first in the Annex. A few years later, they built their house on the hill beyond the office, and his younger son, George, and wife, Dede, moved into the Annex. Since they had one son and three daughters, an addition was made on the Annex where the girls could live, which they called "Raspberry Inn". In recent years, the annex has been the summer home of Win and Cannie Shafer.

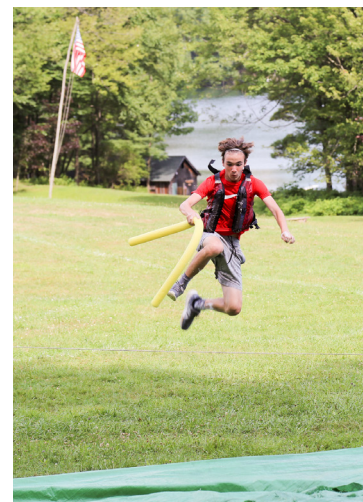

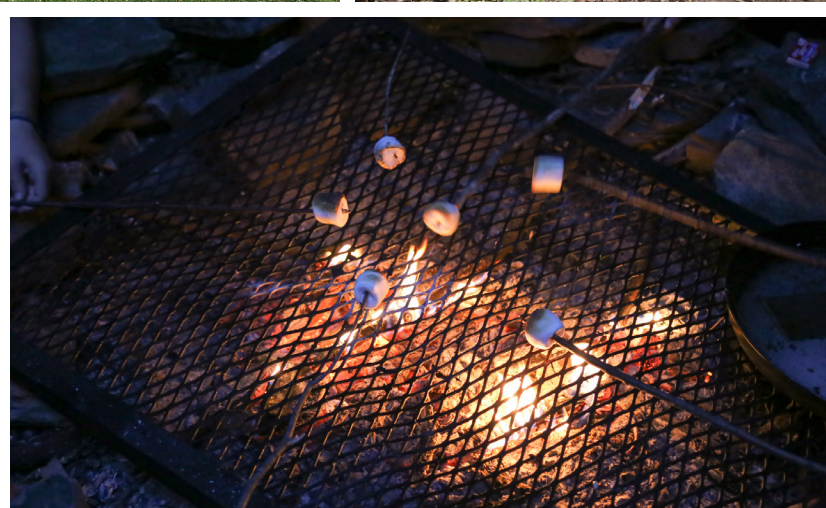
