A Tribute ^{to} Jacquie Meehan

A Tribute for and Thanks to Jacquie Meehan From Cannie and Win Shafer

Almost twenty years ago, Win and I were in desperate need of a new Camp secretary and found Terri Evans through local friends. Soon thereafter, Terri was offered a great position at Montrose High School, but she had brought along her friend Jacquie Meehan to help with bookkeeping. Jacquie sat in (the very warm) back supply room of the Office that summer and when Terri left, Jacquie assumed the desk in the middle office. Win and I knew immediately that things would be great! Not only was Jacquie capable, but she also had the ability to ignore the occasional mouse, bat or raccoon in the Office, she could reorganize all the files, do payroll, gather lake water samples, fulfill all transportation needs, protect and distribute the office supplies, fill the copier and fax machine constantly, answer the phones politely with genuine information, deliver the piles of mail and packages to mailboxes ...and introduce Darby (our Office guardian) to apprehensive UPS and FedEx drivers. Jacquie loved the campers, she supported their nervous parents and she showed her appreciation and concern for each and every member of the staff. Jacquie became our confidant, as well as our friend.

The Susquehannock Spirit filled Jacquie and she filled others with the same. Jacquie shared her love of all things Orange + Blue with everyone! Jacquie came to us with training as a school nurse and an elementary school secretary, along with a family of her own. She was kind, patient, and positive to a fault. Many, many campers wandered into the Office needing a band-aid, or an encouraging "you will be a-ok, you wouldn't be normal if you did not miss home." Jacquie would always stop her work and take care of the business at hand. Jacquie spent literally thousands of hours over the years giving directions to parents, delivery drivers, counselors lost in Binghamton and translating letters for international parents.

This is only matched by the hours Jacquie spent working on logistics for trips out of camp, runs to airports or bus stations, organizing piles of reports (particularly during American Camp Association accreditation years), looking for misplaced van keys, balancing everyone's account/store pages, locking/unlocking the ancient Office safe (no small feat!) and in most recent years, accounting for the piles of illegal phones confiscated on campus. Jacquie never appeared frustrated and she never complained --- she was the ultimate team player. Maybe it was because we knew her so well, but after we would tell her about something, if she coughed shallowly or rolled her eyes ever so slightly, we knew we might reconsider and would ask her what she thought. She would tell us what she thought, because we trusted each other. And, *she was usually right!*

She and I shared dozens of conversations daily between our shared wall in the Office; Jacquie sitting on one side with me sitting on the other side: laughing and problem solving and worrying. I always loved my seat in the Office because of the passing campers and staff waving and saying hello, but I can not count how many times I saw a camper excitedly walking down to the Lake but turning to yell "Hi, Jacquie!" She would always reply in kind with their name.

The only thing I can recall that Jacquie really did not like doing: using the microphone in the Office. Now granted, she had to pull the mic down and be up on her tiptoes to reach it, but watching her plan her “announcement,” then take a deep breath in preparation, then see her expression as she would hear her own voice broadcasting all over camps was always “worth the price of admission.” I would wait until she turned the mic off and then we would both burst out laughing! Jacquie is a good sport! But who could imagine she was also into merchandising?! I had some of my most fun and pressured times, not just preparing the Camp Store (complete with the Campteen goodies of Jacquie’s selection!) but putting names in and folding countless jerseys and T-shirts and arranging all the clothes and other fun items in the Store. Most importantly, was Jacquie’s role in training the Counselors-in-Training for their big responsibility running Campteen. You have to have been at Camp to really understand all that went into running this high-energy and oftentimes frantic Susquehannock tradition.

Jacquie was not just a colleague, but she served in *loco parentis*! There are many, many young people who knew Jacquie as a Camp constant because she had been there as they had come up through the ranks from camper to CIT to Junior Counselor and then staff member. She had offered support during fights with friends/parents/significant others/teachers/coaches at home who were putting pressure on them: “What do I do, Jacquie?” Too many times to count, someone would come in just as she was packing up to go home and stop her with a worried face asking “What courses should I take next year, Jacquie?” Jacquie would push a chair back from the big wooden table in the Office, sit down and listen to the possibilities!

John Meehan did not realize that when his wife Jacquie joined the Camp staff, it meant that he also joined the Susquehannock “family” and would be sent on errands all over northeast and beyond. Usually he had to find things like supplies for the Camp Store or necessary specialties for a special event, like ears of corn from a local farm stand, or orange and blue glow sticks for the Loyal Guard Chicken Feed. And just like Jacquie, he always did it with a smile! It is no surprise that the sign outside the Meehan’s house in Friendsville reads “Meehan’s Place,” because it is a warm and friendly place, where Jacquie’s children experienced the Susquehannock spirit themselves doing job on campus or working on projects spread out over the floor of Meehan’s Place!

As years rolled on, Win and I could not imagine running Susquehannock for the staff, campers, nor families without Jacquie. I would tell Jacquie how much I disliked weekends because she wasn’t in the Office and that I had her on speed dial. When she left on Fridays, I would say, “You had better come back on Monday,” to which Jacquie would always chuckle and respond with her wry smile, “I will.” We loved watching the traffic at Win’s silly bird feeders he hung outside Jacquie’s window. One afternoon, I heard from my side of the shared wall, “Now there’s one handsome bird!” It was a male Evening Grosbeak ...and she was right! From the Office windows we watched rainbows over Tripp Lake, a welcome treat after the Weather Alert radio had crackled with severe weather announcements. I’d ask if that one was close - most times the answer was no - but we lived through a couple that were close. The running joke was that we would hold on to the Office door together. We experienced late summer cloudbursts where we swept away water and debris from the Office doorstep with brooms, laughing that we hoped *this* was not the time the Office would detach from its supports and start a journey down the hill toward the Lake!

A Tribute to Jacquie Meehan

Before retiring, Win and I wanted to acknowledge two staff members who started at Camp at the same time for their unwavering dedication to Camp. We could not see how Camp could function without them. At the conclusion of the 2018 season, Jacquie and Paul Travis received the first annual SPIRIT OF SUSQUEHANNOCK rain stick staff award. Jacquie exemplifies what is in the spirit of the Susquehannock experience: valuing and fostering relationships, appreciating the sheer beauty of the environment, treating others with openness and compassion, and winning and losing at life with grace! Once you are away from camp, you can understand because you take the Spirit with you and you can share it with others. Those who still remain at Susquehannock also keep that spirit alive and help others to carry it with them wherever they go. Jacquie, you have touched the lives of so many Camp people and we are so fortunate for that.

Jacquie and I have had a running joke for years that whenever we have some free time, we are going to hang out at the Lake together. I have also told Jacquie (and poor John) not to be surprised when they look out at their beautiful backyard and see Win and I are floating in their pool. Camp friends for life!

In Loving Memory

John DeWitt Titman, Jr.

A devoted supporter of Camp Susquehannock, John D. Titman, Jr. died January 2, 2021, at a retirement home in Rye, NY.

John was born in Montrose, PA, where his father was postmaster and editor of The Montrose Independent. His father, "Dee" Titman, joined G. C. Shafer "King", in 1916, supporting the summer camp "King" began in 1905. He became an invaluable help in promoting the camp far and wide. He moved to Binghamton, NY, and married Sybil Weeks of Binghamton. When John, Jr. was born, "Dee" initiated him into the admiration he felt for King Shafer and the camp. John continued and carried on that tremendous support of Susquehannock for his lifetime.

Right after graduation from Princeton in 1951, John took a job in the Personnel Department of NBC in New York City. Three years later he moved to Time, Inc. which became Time Warner. Half of his time at Time was work in the Personnel Dept., the remainder in Facilities, which for John meant everything except the media business: real estate, design, construction, security, travel, purchasing, communications, food services and health management. The last 14 years before retirement in 1998, John was vice-president for Facilities at HBO. Inc.

John met Narcissa Hargroves when both were working at Time, Inc. They were married in Philadelphia July 21, 1956. They have two daughters, Holly and Susan. Susan lives nearby in Brooklyn, NY, and Holly in Berkeley, CA. Campers may remember Susan's son, Lucas Hedges, who starred in "Manchester By the Sea" in 2016, "Lady Bird" in 2017, and "Three Billboards Outside Ebbings, Mo" in 2017. He appeared in four films nominated for the Best Picture Oscar.

Despite John's busy life at Time Warner, he continued to spend as much time as possible at his cottage by Tripp Lake. He stayed in close touch with camp leaders through challenging times when camper numbers dropped and when executive directors failed to help and resigned. He knew all the Shafer families well, both the Ed Shafers and George Shafers. He served on the original board of Camp Susquehannock, Inc. from 1990-2000.

John helped plan and attended the 75th anniversary dinner in 1983 at the Union League. In 1989 he became the first director of fundraising for the Susquehannock Fund. When Susquehannock went non-profit, he made all arrangements for the March 10, 2001, dinner at the Philadelphia Cricket Club to announce the new board and introduce new executive director, Bill Gallagher. He carefully went through all finances for both camps, including interviewing Sandy at Anro, Inc. who prints "Who's Who" for camp. He joined Jon Price and Rush Smith as trustees of the new CSI board.

John kept in constant touch with the Shafers and the camp. We have had dinner with him many times over the years. We all very much appreciate the invaluable help, guidance and advice he gave us over many years.

We all at Susquehannock send our deepest condolences to Narcissa, Holly and Susan. John was a good man and true friend of camp, a constant support and presence over his entire life. He has been very much missed by us all the last few years when illness prevented his coming up to Tripp Lake. If we can help his family in any way, please let us know.

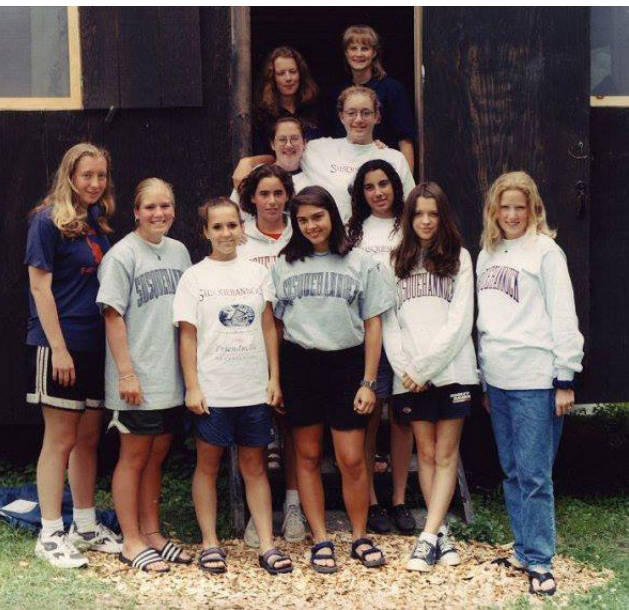

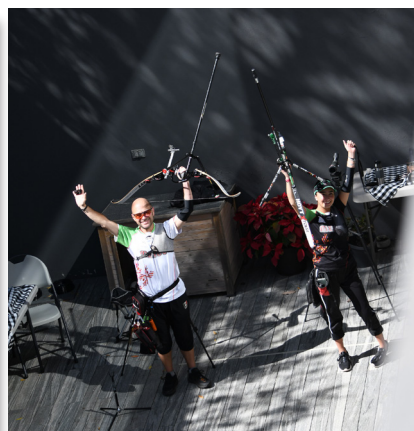
Hello to our friends at Camp!

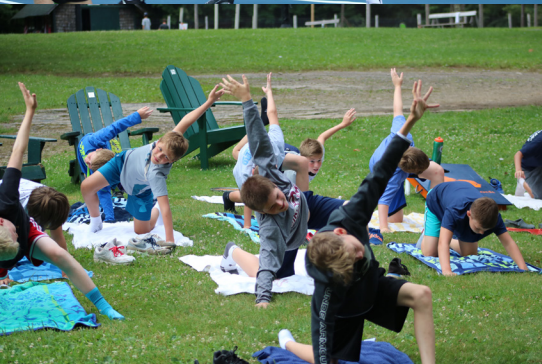
